SCHOOL FACILITIES

School Facilities

Country Lane Elementary was originally constructed in 1959 and is currently comprised of 31 permanent classrooms, 4 Extended Care and music room portables, a cafeteria, 3 playgrounds, grassy play areas, and a library/media center. During the summer of 2012, solar panels were installed along with a new HVAC system. In 2013, school renovations included new carpet and tile in the school office and staff room. In 2017 the playground blacktops were refinished and the infrastructure for technology was improved. In 2018 the track was widened and leveled. In 2019 a new intercom system was installed, restrooms were made ADA compliant, new drinking fountains were installed, three new play structures were installed and the blacktop was resurfaced and restriped. We also created a STEAM lab for all students to utilize. In the spring of 2021 two sensory walks were painted on the black top.

Cleaning Process

Country Lane Elementary provides a safe and clean environment for students, staff, and volunteers. The district has adopted cleaning standards for all schools. A joint effort between students and staff helps to keep the campus clean. The administration works daily with the custodial staff to develop sanitation schedules that ensure a clean, safe, and functional learning environment. Every classroom is equipped with hand sanitizer, and soap and paper towels for hand washing. Each classroom has a disinfecting kit that teachers utilize for shared materials or high touch surfaces.

Maintenance & Repair

A scheduled maintenance program is administered by the Country Lane custodial staff on a regular basis, with heavy maintenance functions occurring during vacation periods. Additionally, a scheduled maintenance program is administered by Moreland School District to ensure that school grounds and facilities remain in excellent condition. A work order process is used when issues arise that require immediate, in-depth, or specialized attention. Emergency repairs are given the highest priority; repair requests are completed efficiently and in the order in which they are received. Ventilation systems are checked routinely and new MERV 13 filters are installed quarterly.

INSTRUCTIONAL MATERIALS

Pursuant to the settlement of Williams vs. the State of California, Moreland Elementary School District thoroughly inspected each of its school sites at the start of the 2019-20 school year to determine whether or not each school had sufficient and good quality textbooks, instructional materials, and/or science laboratory equipment. The date of the most recent District Resolution on the Sufficiency of Textbooks was September 22, 2020.

All students, including English Learners, are required to be given their own individual textbooks and/or instructional materials (in core subjects), for use in the classroom and to take home if necessary. Additionally, all textbooks and instructional materials used within the District must be aligned with the California State Content Standards and frameworks, with final approval by the Board of Education.

PHYSICAL FITNESS ASSESSMENT

Family Involvement

Families are active partners in educating children at Country Lane. Many families volunteer in the classroom, as well as participate in our Creative Colts Art program, Project Cornerstone, Track Pack, Fun Zone, copy center support, room parents, and library. Our well-organized and enthusiastic Home and School Club raises money each year for field trips, assemblies, teacher supplements, library books, playground equipment, and computer software. At school events such as our Back-to-School Night, Open House, Walk-A-Thon, Art Festival, International Fair, family dances, various performing arts shows, STEAM fair, and other community building events, we have a strong student and

parent attendance. Our families support Country Lane through our donation drive and Walk-A-Thon in the fall and the Home & School Club Board is managing these funds to support students.

SCHOOL SAFETY

Safety of students and staff is a primary concern of the school. The school is always in compliance with all laws, rules, and regulations pertaining to hazardous materials and state earthquake standards. The School Site Safety plan is reviewed and updated annually by the School Safety Committee. All revisions are communicated to the both the classified and certificated staff. The school’s disaster preparedness plan includes steps for ensuring student and staff safety during a disaster. Fire, lockdown, and disaster drills are conducted on a regular basis throughout the school year. There is a designated area for student drop off and pick up. Additionally, visitors must check in at the school office before entering the school campus.

SUSPENSIONS AND EXPULSIONS

COUNSELING AND SUPPORT SERVICES

Counseling & Support Staff

In addition to academics, the staff at Country Lane Elementary strives to assist students in their social and personal development. Staff members are trained to recognize at-risk behavior in all students. The school values the importance of on-site counseling and has procedures in place to ensure that students receive the services they need. We currently have a school counselor on site 3 days a week. Staff members are devoted to helping students deal with problems and assisting them to reach positive goals. The school offers a variety of programs to students who are struggling to meet grade-level standards. Programs that support student success include: reading and math intervention, and ability-grouped reading flex classes.

Once students are identified as academically at-risk, an improvement program is developed that may include intervention or instruction from specialized personnel. The Tier II Committee develops and monitors a Problem Solving Plan (PSP) for students with academic, emotional, social, and/or developmental concerns who have been referred by staff or parents. Based on the outcome of the PSP, a SST (Student Study Team) may be convened. This could lead to a referral to Special Education for further evaluation/assessment. If students qualify and are identified with special education needs, they are accommodated with a variety of options and in the least restrictive environment possible. The Individualized Education Plan (IEP) defines the individualized instruction a special needs student will receive, which may include placement in a special day class, the resource specialist program, the speech & language program, and/or sessions with other members of the support staff.

Students are identified as English Learners (EL) during the enrollment process and through the English Language Proficiency Assessments for California (ELPAC). Country Lane provides English Language Development (ELD) integrated, as well as designated support, during the regular school day. Teachers incorporate SDAIE (Specially Designed Academic Instruction in English) methods throughout their lessons to better support EL students. These students are also offered targeted support from our reading intervention teacher.

The school also offers a fee based after school program through the Extended Care for students.
